


What is Climate Justice?

The actions that must be taken to prevent the collapse of human societies caused by climate catastrophes are actions to protect humanity.

It is the poor who are being hit first and hardest by environmental collapse and extreme weather.

In Britain, the **housing crisis** includes 2 million homes unfit for habitation and at least 14 million homes requiring urgent insulation to manage extreme cold spells and heatwaves.

Any hope of the UK meeting targets for emissions reductions as part of the global targets for all countries to their bit is lost if we do not reduce car use. That means investment in affordable, frequent and integrated public transport fuelled by **renewable, fossil-free electricity**.

We also need to **renationalise utilities** - electricity, fuel, water & sewage services, refuse & recycling, to end pollution and ensure low-emission provision to all households, organised to meet the needs of everyone not the private profits of a few super-rich at the expense of people and planet.


Global Justice!

Climate change does not respect nations or human boundaries. Preventing collapse requires international co-operation and reparations for the hardest hit across the Global South, with planning, reorganising production and distribution for the whole of humanity.

The changes to production recognises that many current jobs will soon be made redundant, unaffordable and outdated as the climate catastrophe hits. We need to plan for a Just Transition, with redeployment, retraining and up-skilling with protected pay and employment rights away from fossil-fuelled industries and into **Climate Jobs Now!**

Trade unions have the most vital and urgent role to play in fighting for climate justice and negotiating for workers rights in the climate emergency.
